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

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### Why Tag Fish? (Revisited)

This is an edited version of Boreman's explanation of the science of fish tagging, taken from Volume 23, Number 2, UNDERWATER NATURALIST.



Anglers who tag and release fish, such as those participating in the ALS program, are curious to know what happens to the fish they release. They are interested in how far it travels, where it goes, and how long before it is once again caught. However, other valuable scientific information can be obtained from tagging programs. By releasing tagged fish and then recapturing them at some later date, scientists can estimate population size, survival rates, and relative contribution of individual populations to the harvestable stock.

The principle behind using a tagging program to estimate population size involves ratios. Scientists release a known number of fish and, after allowing sufficient time for the tagged fish to intermingle with the untagged fish in the population, they sample the population and record the ratio of tagged fish recaptured to the total number of fish sampled. Knowing how many they originally released, they can then extrapolate from the ratio to an estimate of total abundance

For example, if 1000 tagged fish are released and half of the number of fish that are subsequently sampled have tags, then the population abundance at the time of tagging should be close to 2000 fish. Of course, this is a very simple case, but all methods of estimating population abundance using tagging are based on this ratio principle.

Estimating survival rates by using a tagging program requires release of tagged fish and subsequent repeated sampling of the population over time. As tagged fish succumb to fishing or natural mortality. the number of tagged fish still at large will decline over time, and repeated sampling should show that the ratio of tagged fish to total fish sampled also declines over time. The rate at which the ratio of tagged to total fish captured declines with repeated sampling gives an indication to the survival rate. Ken Sprankle and I used such an estimation procedure with the tagging data compiled by ALS to see if the restrictions on harvest of striped bass instituted by the northeast coastal states in 1984 had any noticeable effect on adult survival. They most certainly did. Prior to the new

regulations, the average survival of adult striped bass was an estimated 37% per year; survival increased to an estimated 68% per year after the more restrictive coastwide management plan for striped bass went into effect.

Finally, the relative contribution of individuals to the harvestable stock can be estimated by first capturing the fish when the populations are separated (usually on their spawning grounds), then examining the proportions of tags returned from the fisheries representing each population.

The key to using a tagging program to derive estimates describing population characteristics such as migratory behavior, abundance, mortality, and relative contributions to fisheries is the removal of as much bias from the estimates as possible. Significant bias may occur when (1) tagged fish do not survive as well as untagged fish (perhaps due to trauma caused by the tagging experience), (2) fish lose their tags before being recaptured, (3) tagged fish are easier to catch then untagged fish, and (4) not all fish caught with tags are reported. Adjustments to the estimates can be made if any of these assumptions are violated by knowing the direction and extent of the bias. The first three biases can be tested experimentally in a relatively straightforward fashion. The fourth, under-reporting of tags, is very difficult to test because it relies on the willingness of people who catch tagged fish to take

the time (and perhaps expense) to report or return the tag to the requesting agency or organization.

People do not report tags for a number of reasons, probably the most important of which is out of concern that reporting capture of a tagged fish will subject them to more restrictions on their fishing activity. In some cases, their concern is justified. An example is the long-term tagging program for Atlantic salmon conducted by the Maine Sea-Run Salmon Commission, which eventually led to institution of seasonal closures and harvesting quotas on salmon interception fisheries in Canada and Greenland.

Reporting tags is a matter of individual choice and conscience. Under-reporting tags erodes the scientific underpinnings of fishery management. Failure to remove the bias caused by under-reporting tags from a stock assessment may lead fishery managers to the false assumption that overfishing is not occurring. As a result, additional restrictions may not be placed on the fishery and the stock will eventually collapse.

The potential extent of scientific information that can be gained by volunteer tagging programs is enormous. As we have witnessed for the coastal migratory stock of striped bass, management based on science can work. The quality of the science depends on availability of information, expertise of the scientists, and, just as importantly, on the conscientious efforts of fish taggers and catchers.

## Tags Fisheries Biologists Never See Again (But Should)

In a fishery biologist's dream world, any tag applied to a fish would be retained by that fish until the fish was recaptured, at which time the recapturer would immediately return the tag to the fishery biologist, complete with all relevant data. Fortunately, this scenario occurs frequently enough to make mark-recapture programs work. But exceptions occur often enough to force fishery biologists to have to consider these issues.

An unbiased mark-recapture study is impossible because of tag loss by fish and non-reporting of captures of marked fish. The actual return rate is the number of tags returned divided by the number of marked fish released. Thus, the actual return rate may be lower or higher than our theoretical optimum because either the numerator (non-reporting) or denominator (tag loss), or both, may be biased downward. These biases, if uncorrected, may seriously inflate or deflate population abundance estimates calculated from mark-recapture data.


Why would fish lose a tag? Some tags are natural (e.g., particular genotypes, parasites) and are not lost, but they are not unique to individuals and are technologically difficult and expensive to use. What we typically think of as tags are manmade devices that attach to a fish (e.g., spaghetti tag used by the American Littoral

Society), or unnatural marks imposed on a fish's body (e.g., fin clip, brand). Attached tags or unnatural marks create what are essentially minor wounds. Healthy fish undergo a healing process, which may result in dislocation of an attached tag or obliteration of an unnatural mark. So tagging fish successfully is really a matter of finding the best tradeoff between affixing a device or mark large enough to be detected by humans, but small enough and situated smartly so that it doesn't threaten the fish's health nor instigate a strong physiological rejection response.

That an attached tag needs to be well adapted to a fish's morphological features is often overlooked, but the tagging literature is chock full of the results of tagging experiments in which a particular tag simply did not work well for a given species and was supplanted as new tag styles emerged. Figure 1 shows some of the most widely used attached tags and their recommended sites for placement on a fish's body. The sites fall into three general categories: the gill flap, the area under the dorsal fins, and the belly region. Note the intended relationship between tag form and its attachment point. Tags meant to attach to the gill flap are short and flat to prevent interference with essential gill movements. Tags that insert under the dorsal fin are either braced on both flanks of the fish, looped through the trunk, or held in place through one flank by the vertebral spines of the internal fin supporting elements, named pterygiophores. Tags that are inserted into the belly cavity have anchors that are broad and flat, to take advantage of the large but soft abdominal

which of several alternative tag styles would perform best for their requirements? There are two empirical methods, both involving tradeoffs. One is to tag fish and hold them in tanks to directly observe the tag loss rate. This provides absolute measure, but one obtained under the unrealistic conditions of captivity. The other method is to tag fish with two different tags affixed at different body locations and then to release them to the wild. Fishermen can provide information from fish recaptured that bore both tags or that lost only one of the two; thus, only a relative retention rate of one tag type to the other can be calculated because there are no data acquired on the number of fish that lost both tags.

There are a number of quantitative models of tag loss and some of these attempt to partition tag loss into two categories. Type I tag loss is tag shedding that occurs immediately after release; Type II shedding occurs throughout the tagging experiment. Both forms of tag shedding may not occur equally among all size classes of fish tagged. For instance, I helped com-

pare the results of the Hudson River Foundation's and the Hudson River electric utilities' Striped Bass Tag Recovery Program with a tagging study conducted in the Hudson River during the 1970's by Texas Instruments. A fundamental result of both studies disagreed: the new study found that larger striped bass were caught farther from the mouth of the Hudson, whereas the earlier study found no relationship between fish size and distance traveled.

The tag used in the new study was an internal anchor tag, a style that is anchored by the abdominal wall and therefore, should not be sensitive to fish size. However, the Texas Instruments study used the then popular Dennison-style tag. Dennison tags have 10 mm wide t-bar anchors designed to latch behind paired bones such as pterygiophores or vertebral spines; in the study in question, vertebral spines were used. I examined a series of striped bass skeletons and found out that fish 592 mm and longer have a 10 mm gap or greater between the particular vertebral spines used to anchor the

Dennison tags. We then reanalyzed the Texas Instruments data base, distinguishing between striped bass shorter and longer than 592 mm. Based on the number of days at large following release, it was apparent that recaptures of the larger fish became scarce very rapidly, indicating Type I loss, whereas smaller fish were recaptured at a fairly steady rate. The only reasonable explanation was that larger striped bass, which had interspine distances greater than the 10 mm width of the tag anchor, shed their tags quickly. The net result in the earlier study was an erroneous conclusion-the actual tendency to shed tags faster, so that larger stripers no longer bore tags by the time they reached locations distant from the river.

The particular design of tags had led to other artifactual results. A primary way striped bass were tagged during midcentury was through the use of Petersen discs affixed to gill covers; however, Petersen discs were notorious for snagging on gill nets, leading to extremely high recapture rates. One tagging study employing

Petersen discs that was conducted in the heyday of the Albemarle Sound gill net fishery for striped bass resulted in the unheard of recapture rate of 50% in just 49 days; alternative tag types provided much lower (and more realistic) estimates of harvest rates.

There are also reasons tags are never returned from fish that still bore tags when recaptured. Some tags simply don't hold up. In the program conducted by the Hudson River Foundation and the Hudson River electric utilities, the first tag used was an internal anchor tag. Within nine months after release, we began to receive tags with some of the printing worn off. Apparently, the plastic streamer portion of the tag that hung externally from the fish's belly hardened into a curved set. As the tagged fish swam in the wild, whatever was on the front surface of the streamer rubbed against the sand, rocks, and barnacles below, so that, depending on the orientation of the streamer, these tags either lost their instructions to the angler or the serial number of the individual fish.

## **Tagging Sharks**

"We should learn more about sharks." Those were Lionel A. Walford's words in 1962 to Jack Casey, an aspiring young marine scientist who had just joined the staff of Dr. Walford's fledgling federal marine laboratory, located in an abandoned Army hospital on Sandy Hook. Thus the beginnings of a project to catch, tag, and release large Atlantic sharks. Administration of the program later moved to the marine lab at Narragansett, RI, and sometime after that Casey retired, but he still drops into the office, now called the National Marine Fisheries Service's Cooperative Shark Tagging Program.

It's called "cooperative" because most of the tagging is done by everyday shark anglers. There are now some 7000 such volunteers on both sides of the Atlantic. Between 1962-2004, they tagged more

that 180,000 sharks of 52 species; 11,000 sharks of 33 species have been recaptured, 88% of them represented by nine species in order: blue, sandbar, tiger, dusky, shortfin mako, blacktip, Atlantic sharpnose, and scalloped hammerhead. Three species -- blue, shortfin mako, and tiger -- have been tracked more that 3000 nautical miles, and one shark swam free for 27.8 years between tag and recapture.

Data collected by the program provide information on stock identity, migration (including rates and routes), abundance, age-and-growth, mortality, and behavior. It is also an important way to increase biological understanding of sharks and gather information for rational resource management. To try to solve the problem, we added a clear plastic sleeve to the streamer. however, algae grew between the streamer and its sleeve, resulting in the appearance of a mysterious dark tube emanating from the fish; some anglers reported that they thought the tag "was a piece of wire." It is safe to assume that for both of these tag styles, many recaptures were not reported because the angler either did not recognize the tag as such or could not read the tag to know where to send it. We switched to a completely reengineered tag highly resistant to abrasion.

Then there is the problem of non-reporting the recaptured fish. Non-reporting may occur for a variety of reasons. Commercial fishermen sometimes believe that an information provided by them about their catches will be used to justify further harvest restrictions. I have heard commercial fishermen speak of hoarding dozens of tags that they had no intention of ever returning to fishery biologists. Also, some anglers may not want to disrupt their fishing to remove a tag in the middle of a striper feeding frenzy, whereas others won't risk reclaiming a tag while fishing in precarious situations, such as being perched on a wave washed jetty at night. A small minority of fishermen are just lazy and can't be bothered.

There are a couple of ways non-reporting rates may be estimated. One is to use a staggered reward system, in which the tags used have different reward values printed on them, ranging from no reward on up. An estimate of non-reporting of low or no value tags may be obtained by determining the increase in return rates that can be expected to occur with increased reward values. Another approach involves surreptitiously tagging already caught fish, such as directly from the fish buckets on a party boat. Assuming the fishery biologist is not caught in the act of tagging, they will know exactly how many tagged fish went home with the unknowing anglers and can estimate directly the non-reporting rate.

When one considers the numbers of untagged fish swimming in the wild, a tagged fish represents a scarce and valuable commodity that required a good deal of planning, field effort, cost, and personal commitment. Recaptures of these fish are comparatively rare; thus, it behooves fishery biologists to use the best-retained tags they can and for sport and commercial fishermen to follow though and return tags. The fishery biologist's dream world of perfect tag retention and compliance in reporting probably will never occur. Fortunately, there are ways to estimate and correct these nagging biases.

## **Billfish/Pelagic Tagging**

The National Marine Fisheries Service's tagging program for Atlantic coast marlin, tuna, and the like started in 1952 at its laboratory in Woods Hole, MA. Its administration is now handled at the Fisheries Service lab in Miami, FL. Its tags are designed to be darted in the shoulder of a fish brought alongside a boat.

Here are some of its numbers to date: The target species, with number of fish tagged and tags returned are sailfish: 116,136 (1988), blue marlin 52,619 (792), white marlin 46,575 (973), bluefin tuna 45,101 (4889), swordfish 11,789 (421), yellowfin tuna 10,434 (440), bigeye tuna 1347 (10), and albacore 1000 (28).

As a percentage of returns to tagged fish, bluefin tuna lead the pack at 10.8%, and bigeye finish last at .0.78%. As to times and distance, a bluefin tuna comes in first among the pelagics, 14.02 years between captures; a sailfish leads the bill-fish at 17.99 years. Distance: a yellowfin tuna accounted for 6020 miles, left in the dust by a blue marlin at 9233 miles.

## Tales Taggers Tell III

As we celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the American Littoral Society's Fish Tagging Program, I look back on more than 20 years of involvement.

In a newsletter late in 1982, volunteers were asked to "come forward" to help code 17 years of A.L.S. tag data needed by the National Marine Fisheries Service. Woods Hole, MA. Scientists there were studying the problem of the vanishing striped bass and our data were very valuable. In charge of the coding was Cindy Zipf, an intern fresh from college. I came onboard to help. The rest is history. Scientists placed a moratorium on the catching of striped bass, Zipf went on to become the executive director of Clean Ocean Action, and here I am. At that time. we were housed in Building 22, Sandy Hook, (we've moved across the way to Buliding 18), and then just as now, fishermen came off the beach to talk fish, join, and buy tags. One such person was Dorothy Obropta, who came in covered in sand, wet and windswept, dressed in yellows. She has been an active participant. great friend, and volunteer ever since. (See Littorally Speaking, Mid Atlantic edition, Summer 2005). Another set of regulars from the beach were young Francis Urban and his great uncle. Francis's father was one of the original member/taggers going back to March of 1967. In a letter, he received from the originator of the program, Graham Macmillan, Graham wrote:

Fish tagging kits are available on the basis of 5 tags for \$1, which is what it costs to prepare and mail them. The Society maintains the records, publishes the results in Underwater Naturalist and notifies the individuals involved. The Society publishes Underwater Naturalist

on an infrequent basis, in which is recorded the tagging returns as well as observations. on a scientific and semi-scientific basis. In the near future. the Society plans to distribute to its members the most informative booklet on artificial reef construction that has been released to Membership in the Society is \$5 a year for individuals, \$7 for families and \$10 for clubs. If you would like to become a member, we would most certainly welcome you aboard.

The Francis Urban family joined. Prices have changed, data are now on our website, but the original premise remains the same. Young Francis learned his lessons well, joined when he was old enough, and has tagged ever since. In July of 2004, I received a note: "Most of the big fish seem to be gone for now. Largest this year was 51" and 52,20 pounds. Unfortunately, it died and could not be tagged. Last batch of tags I sent, one was tagged by USFWS. I removed the tag. and placed an ALS tag in its place. Info from USFWS showed that it was orginally tagged 1/22/94, off the North Carolina coast, 21.95". When I tagged her on 6/16/04, she was 44", 31 pounds. Two days later, 6/18/04, Francis tagged a 38", 19 pound striper in the ocean off Sandy Hook. On Dec. 7, 2004, this 38" fish was caught in a beach seine at Currituck Beach, NC, and was returned by NMFS observer, Joe Mello. In the month of June 2004, Francis tagged 52 striped bass ranging from 35", 16 pounds to 48", 30 pounds. So when you see the signs "Take a Kid Fishing" or you get the opportunity to teach a young person how to fish. remember the legacy of the Urban family.

The stories from taggers and the friend-

ships (by mail and telephone) remain a wonderful part of the job. Sometimes these stories provide unusual endings. This was the case of tag #656866, placed in a 10" striped bass by Capt. Al Anderson on 4/28/05, in the Thames River, CT. (See Vol. 26.4 for more). On 6/4/05, this tag was found in an osprey nest on the Westport River, MA, by Alan F. Poole of the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology, Ithaca, NY, conducting his annual osprey survey. For details, see the Field Note on page 17.

The strength of our program has been from Maine to Delaware Bay, but we are

expanding into the Chesapeake and North Carolina. These areas have always played an important role in our program, as many of our fish tagged "up north" go south for the winter. A 25" bluefish tagged by Eugene Mayer, 9/10/04, in Huntington Bay, NY, was recovered by a fish-house worker in Wanchese, NC. The fish was commercially caught in a sink net off Oregon Inlet. Another 14" bluefish, tagged at Eaton's Neck, NY, by Art Schweithelm was recaptured by Doris Calvanesa, 5/2/05, at Frisco, NC. She wrote: "I was thrilled to catch my firsttagged fish in my whole life, while fishing in the ocean at the Cape Hatteras National Seashore campground. I was fishing on the beach at 10 a.m. in Frisco, when the fish hit. It put up quite a struggle and was hard for me to reel in. At the surf's edge my husband helped me get it in. What a thrill to catch a fish that swam all the way from NJ to NC." (Doris now knows that the fish swam even farther. Only the tag came from NJ).

In May, we asked our taggers to submit stories for this special anniversary edition. An impartial editorial board sat and deliberated for days choosing those to be published. So here goes.

### **Taggers Tell Their Fish Stories**

#### **NEW BOAT. SAME FISH**

On 8-9-03 I was out on my brand new boat (Bassing Boy). I caught and tagged a striped bass, the first tag on my new boat - tag #586500. Two weeks later around the same spot, the boat that was next to me caught a striper with a yellow tag. I asked him for the number; it was #586500. I have caught my own tagged fish three times already, but I have never witnessed my own tagged fish being caught by someone else. Talk about happenstance.

#### A WELL TRAVELED FLUKE

My most interesting fish tagging story was when one of the 13 fluke my father and I tagged on June 20, 2000, five miles southwest of Jones Inlet, New York, was recaptured on January 5, 2003, by a commercial fishing vessel working offshore of Assateague, Maryland. The fish was discovered after it was boxed at the Martin Fish Company, Maryland. At the time of tagging, the fluke was 14" and 16" when recaptured. That was also the third fluke we tagged that day that was reported recaptured.

#### THE STORY OF POP'S HOLE

In 1988 my dad came up from Florida to visit with us. I had been catching striped bass on a regular basis at this very tight and small cove on the east side of Shippan Avenue, Stamford, Connecticut. The area was 50 to 60 feet long parallel to the shoreline. We fished 15 or 20 feet offshore, at low tide; this area can be walked on.

I wanted dad to catch a striped bass in the worst way. I set up a chunking rod with a half a bunker for bait,. After a short period, the bunker got picked up and was moving away. Dad free spooled properly and when I told him to hit him, dad did.. But he forgot to put the spool in gear and came up with the biggest

bird's nest I have ever seen. I tried hard not to laugh but it was funny at the time. That fish was long gone. We worked on that mess for a while, then dad started to retrieve the slack line and he said, "I'm hung up on the bottom." The only problem was the bottom was moving. After realizing that the fish was still hooked, dad had his day playing this 20-pounder into the net. From that day on, this spot would be called Pop's Hole and it stands today. Dad would never catch another bass.

A year later, in June of 1989, I caught, tagged and released a 32" bass at Pop's Hole (bunker chunk). In July, 1990, my son Brian caught the same bass at 33" at Pop's Hole (swimming plug). In September, 1991, I brought a fishing buddy, Frank Ryan, to Pop's Hole. He used a live bunker and proceeded to foul hook the same bass in the right eye at 34". We knew it would go blind in that eye but we tagged and released it. That was recapture number three.

In May, 1992, the fish was caught a forth time by Paul Sabella somewhere on the Hudson River, Kingston, NY. Paul removed the tag and released the bass. After the tag was processed at the American Littoral Society I was given Paul's phone number. We had a long chat. He did confirm that the right eye was glazed over. Paul caught the bass on a live herring; it was still 34".

Then in the summer of 1993, Frank Ryan captured a 35" bass with a right eye glazed over several hundred yards way from Pop's Hole. It thus had been unofficially recaptured a fifth time. Frank tagged and released it. It hasn't been heard from since.

#### THE SEAL ATE MY FISH

I fish the ocean side of Cape Cod off the beach. About 16 years ago a couple of gray seals started a colony on Monomoy Island. The year before last I was at the beach just

before sunrise and hooked a real big striper (40" at least). I was fighting him for a while and I could see him from time to time when all of the sudden this big seal came up and took my fish and broke my line. I do not tag fish when the seals are around.

Usually every summer I hook at least 100 skates; last year I didn't hook one. I think the seals cleaned them out over the winter. I also heard they are doing a number on lobster.

#### ARE THESE FISH STORIES?

The local newspaper covered it this way: "Morrisville, PA - George Horvath knew that he might catch anything fishing in the warm water discharge at the power plant in Hamilton, NJ (on the Delaware River near Trenton, about 80 miles upstream from the ocean). The water temperature was 84 degrees, 10 degrees warmer than the rest of the Delaware. Still, he never expected to catch a piranha.

Horvath, a retired computer systems specialist, said he caught the fish with a 7-foot rod, heavy line and cornmeal as bait. He was fishing for carp, he said, when he caught the piranha. He said he also caught three carp that day.

"A spokesperson from NJ Department of Environmental Protection, said the exotic fish, native to the warm waters of South America, had likely been an aquarium pet that got too big. 'Someone probably had grown tired of the fish and tossed it into the river...our request to the public. To those who own these types of exotic fish, is if they can no longer take care of them they should take them back to a pet store rather than throw them into our waters'."

Here are some other Horvath reports: On August 15, 1995, a person with the same name as my brother, Joe Horvath, caught a striped bass in Shark River, NJ, that I had tagged 12 days earlier in Spring Lake, NJ...On July 7, 2003, Michelle St. Laurent caught a striped bass and a bluefish at Sandy Hook, NJ, that I had tagged in Manasquan Inlet, December 22, 2001, and May 25, 2003...On July 7, 2001, I caught, tagged, and released a legal sized fluke at noon aboard Paul Haertel's sport fishing boat ANGLER II in 60 feet of water four miles east of Harvey Cedars, NJ. I caught the same fish at 7:00 p.m. the same day and kept it because it had swallowed the hook.

...On May 28, 1998, I caught, tagged, and released a striped bass in the tidal Delaware River south of Trenton. I caught the same fish on four consecutive days from June 21-24, 1998 with the same bait. The last two times I caught the fish, it appeared to know what was happening. It didn't fight at all, just swam toward me. The fifth time I released the fish, I didn't see any hook holes, red spots or damage. It was in perfect condition. It was a SUPER FISH.

#### THE BEST LAID PLANS...

Having tagged and released well over 3000 striped bass over the past 15 years, I consider myself fairly adept at the process involved in landing, measuring, weighing, tagging, and releasing fish in an organized and expedient manner to insure their survival and generate future returns. However...

Last summer, on June 27, 2004, I was fishing in one of my favorite spots in Westport, CT, and landed a nice 38", 24-pound striped bass. Uncharacteristic of a larger fish, this one was all over the back of my boat, much like a bluefish behaves, making the tagging operation more difficult than usual. But in short order I had it tagged, measured, weighed, and then performed my usual "walking" operation, where I hold the fish with my two hands (mouth and tail) and walk it in the water until it revives adequately to swim away strongly.

After this release, on my very next pass I wire-lined another smaller (28") striped bass. And opposite of the 38-incher, this one was unusually calm and docile. It never once flinched during the entire tagging operation. So calm, perhaps, that I altered my standard procedure and decided to release this fish directly from the Boga Grip back into the waters of Long Island Sound, skipping the walking procedure. This turned out to be a bad decision. The moment the tail fin of the sleeping 28-incher touched the water it woke up with a vengeance giving a tail slap that both startled me and shook the Boga Grip from my hand. Unfortunately, the grip was still securely attached to the jaw of the bass exactly as it is designed to do. I watched helplessly as the fish swam away from my transom into the deep with my precious (and costly) weighing instrument in tow.

Yes, the grip has a lanyard and no, it wasn't around my wrist. My emotions at the moment raced between shock at what just happened, to

anger at myself for being so careless, to sadness for the fish that would carry the instrument for as long as it could survive. Yet I've captured fish that were entangled in nets, line, and plastic - so who knows, it just may adapt to the extra weight.

What I have learned from this experience is to stay with your tried and true procedures -both for your benefit, and for that of the fish you are releasing. And to all my fellow taggers, if you happen to catch a striped bass carrying both tag number 612571 AND a Boga Grip . . . I WANT IT BACK!



#### TEACHERS AND STUDENTS TAG

I can't recall the exact year but some time during the late 1990's my friend Captain Al Anderson began tagging wintering striped bass in the Thames River, located in southeastern Connecticut. The Thames has a huge population numbering in the tens of thousands of fish, mostly juvenile stripers that spends the winter in the upper reaches of the Thames River.

They are concentrated in dense schools that when they are turned on can produce a hundred or more fish in a tide for anglers fishing with small jigs or trolling small tubes. Around that time Captain Al asked my primary fishing partner, Eric Covino, and me to show him the

Thames River. It didn't take him long to master the Thames. Being the worlds foremost fish tagger it was a slam dunk for him to place thousands of tags in the river's wintering bass in just a few years.

This event took place early in his Thames River tagging exploits. Late in May, about the time the stripers were moving out of the Thames, I was fishing in the near by Mystic River, located about five miles east of the mouth of the Thames. I caught a tagged striper from a big school of fish that was hanging around the mouth of the Mystic River and figured it was probably one of the fish Captain Al had tagged that year or perhaps even one of the hundred tags I had placed in that same striper population with my students that spring.

Once I received the information on that tag, I was not surprised to see Captain Al as the tagger, but I was surprised to find out it was not a Thames River release but instead a fish he had tagged a few days earlier at Montauk Point, New York.

My guess is this striper was probably a migrant from the southern stocks that was rounding the point during a strong incoming tide late in May. Rather than pushing across Block Island Sound to the Rhode Island coast like the majority of these fish appear to do, it had been diverted into Long Island Sound with the tide, where it obviously cut through the Race and inside Fishers Island, finally touching land in Mystic or perhaps the flows from the larger Thames or Connecticut Rivers to the west.

However, because it was only five days between the release and recapture of this fish, it had evidently been drawn to the mouth of the Mystic River soon after hitting the Connecticut coast. I'd guess it had been attracted to Mystic by the worm spawn event that was going on in the river at the time it was caught.

It looked like they would move into the river to feed on the worms at night, then drop back out into the deep channel to escape the sunlight during the day. That school was there and abruptly left within a couple of days after the worms stopped spawning, which is why I believe the worms were the key to this whole event.

Either way it was an interesting catch especially being it had been released less than a week earlier by a personal friend of mine on the other side of Long Island Sound.

I was preparing to launch my first cast with a fly rod when, to my utter astonishment, an oversized wave threw a small striper right at my feet up on the plateau. I watched the fish flop around for a minute or so and soon realized that there was no chance this fish was going to find its way back into the surf before it ran out of energy, so being a faithful tagger for the American Littoral Society, I pounced on the fish, measured it at 22 inches, tagged it and threw it back into the surf. Then I had the distinct pleasure of telling Pam Carlsen that I had tagged my first fish ever using no rod, no reel, no line and no fly. The wonderful thing about this event is that had I not come by at that moment, the fish would certainly have died as the tide was dropping and the fish was flopping away from the water. And this is a true fish story!

### **Striper Tag in Osprey Nest**

25 May, 2005 was a routine day of monitoring Osprey nests in Massachusett's Westport Rivers, tidal rivers that flow close to our southeastern coastal border with Rhode Island. Colleagues and I have been checking this dense concentration of nests - over 70 of them in just 1.5 square kilometers - on and off since the early 1980s, documenting breeding numbers and success.

These nest checks have opened some interesting windows on osprey ecology and behavior, but I don't think that was really on my mind as my daughter, Phoebe, and I nosed our skiff up the river's winding salt marsh creeks, stopping at nest after nest, running a ladder up each to check the contents. The weather was fine, as only a light northern front can produce in late spring on the southern New England coast, and the morning sparkled. But the tide was dropping and those waters are shallow, so despite my reverie I knew we couldn't dawdle.

One nest to go; the final climb of the day. Nests in the Westport River marshes are mostly on short poles just 3-5 meters high, with platforms atop them -- structures built by local naturalists over the past 30-40 years. That's what ospreys like for nesting, at least here in this open saltmarsh landscape: an exposed site, easy to land in, above high tides, and away from shoreline predators. As researchers, we like them too: clustered nests, in extraordinary numbers for such a large bird of prey; safe, easy climbs by ladder to check the contents. In short, a chance to assem-

ble reliable data on a scale rarely known among those who study hawks.

Daughter Phoebe was my nest climber that day. Up she went to this final nest. It's amazing what you find in osprey nests, a mingling of detritus from surrounding human and natural landscapes, the contents a reflection of 21st century flotsam and jetsam. This nest was no different. Woven into its base of large sticks were the odd bits of durable human throwaways: half a sparkly hula-hoop, chartreuse and silver; the broken tip of a fishing rod, a Shakespeare Ugly Stik, I think; corn stalks: the broken back of a beach chair.... along with a cormorant carcass, bouy lines, and a couple of eel pot floats. As is usual, the top of the nest was composed of softer, less coarse material: eelgrass and strips of kelp, a small branch with dead leaves, bits of cardboard and newspaper (Sunday NY Times?), and the inevitable collection of plastic bags, for which nesting ospreys have a remarkable fetish.

Last but not least, a small yellow loop of plastic - an ALS striper tag, #656866: caught and tagged 4/28/05 in the Thames River, CT by Capt. Al Anderson, that veteran ALS striper tagger, and recaught by one of our own equally veteran Westport ospreys (a male; males do all the fishing for their family during the nesting season) just about a month later and delivered to his nest, food for his mate and 2 hungry chicks about 10 days old.

Perhaps not surprising, this tag discovery, although we knew we'd had a lucky day. Those of us who watch ospreys along the southern New England coast know how their diet shifts to reflect fish that are here in abundance. Twenty or thirty years ago these birds were catching mostly winter flounder and herring (alewife and blueback) in spring and early summer. Today

during this same period, it's juvenile stripers morning, noon, and evening. You still see herring from time to time, particularly when the runs are packing nearby streams with fish, and sometimes a tautog or a white perch, but once the school stripers are into the shallows Westport ospreys rarely look elsewhere, until summer menhaden and bluefish arrive. And why should they....? Extraordinarily

plentiful, with schools in the thousands; individuals the right size (about 8-12 inches) and fairly high in fats, helping to boost growth rates of fast-developing young - these stripers are just the ticket for ospreys trying to raise a family during the short New England summer, to fledge young early and strong before they all head south for Brazil Venezuela or Colombia in early September.

man may resent the ospreys dipping into "our" stripers, I like to take the longer view, an ecological approach, and think of the transformation of fish into bird, and how our coastal fishes are helping to fuel this extraordinary movement of ospreys into the tropics each fall. In a world increasingly concerned about balance of payments, here's one small way our stripers are helping.

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#### From The Director's Desk

#### DOWN BY THE BAY

Professor Joseph P. Dutton often reminds me to not take the world too seriously. Often, he notes, the important principles that ought to guide our lives along the coast are as likely to be found in watching small kids and dogs getting wet and muddy as in the weighty tomes of governmental commissions and regulatory agencies. As in his observations of gull behavior, he may be on to something here.

My young sons (8 year old identical twins) have become obsessive (obsessed?) fishermen - as if there were any other kind. Their first and last words of the day during our stay at the beach this year were, "Can we go fishing?" Since this desire provides me with political cover to spend time at the water's edge, as opposed to attending to a variety of pending household tasks, their request was rarely denied.

The average surf rod is 1.75 times taller than either of the twins, so we sought out the bulkheads of the Shark River, where casts made from smaller "Kmart Specials" could reach the water. David - slightly more obsessed than his brother Patrick - set his sights on catching the salmon he was convinced lived in our little Atlantic estuary; his twin girded himself for catching the sharks for which the river was named. My attempts at natural history failed to shake them from these goals.

What we got were sea robins - lots of sea robins (Prionotus sp). Bigelow and Schroeder's Fishes of the Gulf of Maine has this to say, "Sea robins are generally considered trash fish and are taken incidentally in both commercial and recreational hook-andline fisheries. They have long been recognized as tasty, but are not numerous or large enough ....to be of any economic importance." These academic observations played out along the banks of the Shark River. While the boys delighted in hauling-in sea robin after sea robin (accompanied by competitive 'body counts' before tossing them back), they were increasingly distracted by the other, older fishermen's treatment of their own catch who were also catching sea robins rather than the summer flounder they were after. To either side of us, these "trash fish" were summarily tossed onto the pavement of the parking lot, whacked against the bulkhead before being tossed back, and generally abused. Patrick watched this for some time, and questioned why they were doing this. Receiving some unsatisfactory responses about fishermen's views on trash fish, Patrick decided he had had enough, and announced his intentions to "save the sea robins." For the next 20 minutes, this 4 foot tall, 60 pound kid worked his way down the bulkhead, up to and in between fishermen of a variety of heights, colors, girth and cleanliness, and tossed every sea robin back into the water. Live or dead.

Of course, being an 8 year-old boy, Patrick's noble actions toward lesser creatures and wanton waste and cruelty are vulnerable to his curiosity. Later in the afternoon, he was introduced to the more productive use of dead sea robins as bait by a pair of 12 year olds. Boys being boys, the sea robin's journey to its fateful end made a stop for an impromptu anatomy exploration - through the devices of a dull bait knife. The dissection was accompanied by a thorough examination of all internal organs, and a quite lively discussion of their structure and function - complete with squeezing of guts and swim bladders to test their hypotheses.

Respect for ocean creatures, action in the face of mistreatment and waste of life, and active exploration of the wonders of anatomy and physiology. Pretty good lessons from a kid at the edge of the water. And not taking the world too seriously, it was also just a good day fishing with the boys.

#### 100 WEIRD WAYS TO CATCH FISH



Waldman is at it again. Last time it was a collection of oddball oceanic occurrences and the animals that live there ("The Dance of the Flying Gunards"). Now, it's the crazy but often successful lengths that fishermen go to when they are

chasing dinner.

This book is a fisherman's delight, all you would want to know about the latest tricks of the trade from all over the world. Consider "puddling" - tribal people in Nepal and Guyana discovered that the bottoms of some creeks and ponds are so loaded with anoxic sediments featuring hydrogen sulfide that they stir them to stun the fish with the resultant gaseous fumes; or "slating" - tie a short line with a baited hook to a piece of slate. Bury the slate flat at the low tide line, and come back in 12 hours to filet the catch. There's "vingling for sand eels - you pull a knifelike tool with a hook on the end through wet sand, and when you feel resistance, you yank out the sand eel. And how about "noodling" - snatching catfish out of riverbank caves by hand; or "klonking" for ells (large European catfish) with treble hooks baited with leaches. The klonking part is produced with a horse's hoof-like device slammed into the water and then pulled

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up, sort of like unplugging a drain with a plumber's helper. Fishermen say the noises attract ells.

There are these and lots more (totaling, of course, 100). It's all curious and delightful, with some good biology thrown in at no extra charge. And it's clear Waldman witnessed or tried many of the techniques but is too bashful or ashamed to tell the reader how he fared.


#### SEASONS OF THE SEA

By Jay Humphreys

Pineapple Press, Sarasota, FL 151 p. Cloth.

As this book makes clear, Florida's marine life still thrives despite what horrendous stresses have been applied - shore over-development, habitat damage, questionable water quality in estuaries, and fishing pressure. Maybe "thrives" is too strong a word; make it survives or persists.

Humphreys divides Florida's edge into six regions, two east coast, one for the



Keys, and three up the Gulf side to Pensacola. It is, as the author says in his introduction, "about what the changing seasons bring to Florida's coastal waters and the creatures that live there. Readers of this book, whether they are standing on Daytona Beach in winter or Fort Walton Beach in summer, will get a general idea of what is happening in the waters stretching out to the horizon." There is plenty happening as he covers horseshoe crabs, mullet, brown pelicans, mole crabs, snook, shrimp, spiny lobsters, sea turtles, and red tide. It's an enjoyable trip along Florida's coast. The drawings by Jim Wilson are excellent.

#### WILD MOMENTS

By Ted Williams

Storey Publishing, North Adams, Massachusetts 189 p. Cloth.

Ted Williams (the writer) has a keen eye for what nature dishes up. He would be the best of companions for a walk in the woods or on the beach, not the pedantic sort who lectures on the philosophical beauty of the meaning of life as illustrated by the shape of a willow tree in later winter, but rather one who looks and listens and knows that:

- --- Male wood frogs sound like ducks when they quack in a tiny pond of snow melt, "handsome fellows wearing brown waistcoats and rakish black masks..."
- --- "On some marshes, there may be 150,000 (fiddler crabs) per acre. When a courting male spies a female, he'll rear up and wave his fiddle higher and higher until he almost tips over. If she shows interest, he'll rush back and forth between her and the entrance to his burrow."
- --- "In winter, vast schools of male yellow perch ease into the shallows to wait for the larger females...Watch for them along the margins or ponds or lakes.



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Or, if there's safe ice, chop a hole with an ax, lie on your belly, and use your hands to shade out the sun....you'll see the gaudy little fish in the shallow water...If there are ice fishermen about, raise your arm occasionally to show them you're not dead."

There are dozens of short pieces like this through the four seasons. On top of good writing are the fine drawings of John Burgoyne.

# ENTANGLEMENTS: THE INTERTWINED FATES OF WHALES AND FISHERMEN

By Tora Johnson

University Press of Florida, Gainesville 265 p. Cloth.

The ocean is populated by wild food up for grabs. Most of what we eat is raised on land (cattle, chicken, corn, and sugar are examples), and much seafood is now "farmed" (catfish, tilapia, shrimp, and salmon), but most seafood is wild, out there swimming around for anyone to It's called commercial catch and sell. fishing. At the same time that demand for seafood increases, the fishermen see their jobs threatened by tighter regulations and fewer fish to chase. They are also suffering from bad press: longlines kill albatrosses, scallop dredges tear up ocean floor habitat, shrimp by-catch outweighs shrimp catch, crab traps drown terrapins, and the menhaden harvest hurts striped bass.

This readable, detailed book addresses the issue of what to do about the conflicts between fishing gear and whales. Fishermen set out lobster pots and gillnets, whales get tangled up in the gear, and there is trouble on the high seas.

The author tells the story from the beginnings of the Center for Coastal Studies in Provincetown, MA, at the tip of Cape Cod in 1975 to work on land use issues, the early work of Stormy Mayo there, and the development over the years of techniques to free whales from the nets and lines that threaten them. At the same time, the Center stumbled into developing

techniques to gain the trust of commercial fishermen so they could work together to solve a problem. This is not simply a tale of fish killers vs. whale huggers. In wide ranging reporting from small boats at sea cutting lines off whales to uncomfortable meetings with fishermen, Johnson weaves a fascinating story of efforts to protect whales and preserve a fishing culture.

#### **HEMINGWAY ON FISHING**

Hemingway was a fisherman all his life, from cane poles on Walloon Lake in Michigan to his famous battles with big marlin off Cuba, and his writing about fishing is fine, and the influence of fishing on his writing is interesting though not always obvious.

Here you will read parts of "Big Two-Hearted River," "Islands in the Stream," and "The Old Man and the Sea," as well as shorter pieces he wrote for Esquire, Look, and other magazines. His fishing life starts in fresh water, including the trout rivers of the west, but ends up in the Gulf Stream, chasing the big ones with Kip Farrington, Van Campen Heilner, and Michael Lerner

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The macho Hemingway makes several appearances, one a picture of him with his favorite shark shooter, a Thompson submachine gun, and a short bit about the time he missed a shark with his .22 and put a bullet through his calf. Naturally, he toughed it out. To balance that image, he is also pictured fishing in a dress in 1902 at age three - from cute little kid to bewhiskered fish killer.

### A GUIDE TO THE CORAL REEFS OF THE CARIBBEAN

By Mark D. Spalding

University of California Press, Berkeley 240 p. Paper.

This is a fact filled, profusely illustrated book about the coral reefs of the Caribbean. It's important to note right at the beginning that it is not a guide to coral reef fishes. It is about the reefs themselves, wondrous habitats for tropical flora and fauna. The fishes are not short changed; there are hundreds of excellent photos by themselves, in schools, and hanging around their cleaners, exercising their symbiotic relationships, and adopting their artful disguises.



The book covers well all the coral islands (large and small) from Bermuda to the Netherlands Antilles, Trinidad, and Tobago. There is geography and natural history, and there are numerous clear and handsome charts and maps of specific locations. They are by Gillian Bunting,

and they are superb.

Scattered (carefully) throughout are small inserts on such subjects as ghost fishing, marine parks, enjoying algae, diving to the deepest depths (about William Beebe's explorations), humpback whales, and bonefish. The book will be of special interest to snorkelers and scuba divers. It gives tips on many good diving spots, and helps welcome the visitor who plunges into the water and wants to know what's going on down there.

## UNDER ANTARCTIC ICE: THE PHOTOGRAPHS OF NORBERT WU

University of California Press, Berkeley 169 p. Cloth.

This is and is not a coffee table book. It's big format with spectacular photography of the Antarctic continent, above but mostly under water. Then 12 pages of narrative, followed by the photos accompanied by excellent notes. It is a superb combination of beauty and fact.

Consider the travails of diving there cutting a hole through six feet of ice on a windy, way-below-freezing day to get into 32 degree water with the weight of a dry suit, cameras, and extra tanks. But the rewards are great. Because of fine visibility, extremely productive waters, and constant water temperatures that encourage a spectacular variety and size of marine invertebrates, it is an underwater photographer's dream. The marine life of Antarctic waters surpasses the diversity and biomass of coral reefs; there are jellyfish with 30-foot tentacles, slender, dancing starfish and voracious anemones, and fishes with antifreeze in their veins.

Wu doesn't short-change the views of ice fields and flows, whales and seals, and a wonderful description of part of the life history of the emperor penguin: "Penguins begin to congregate (on Cape Crozier) as soon as the sea ice is thick enough to bear their weight, usually in late March or early April. The female lays a single egg in late May or early June, and passes it on to the male. She then heads north to open water

to feed. For the next 64 days or so, the male incubates the egg by carrying it on his feet, covered with a thick fold of skin. These are the coldest, darkest days of the Antarctic winter. Temperatures can fall to -70F and the winds often blow with hurricane force. The males huddle together in groups called scrums, constantly shuffling so that no one has to be on the outside of the group and bear the brunt of the weather for long. When the chick hatches, the male must feed it. He does this by regurgitating a fat and protein secretion from

his crop - even though he has endured three or more months of fast and has lost nearly 50 percent of his body weight. Shortly thereafter - at about the time the sun reappears over the horizon - the female returns to take over, and the male heads north. He may have to walk 100 kilometers (60 miles) or more before he reaches open water and can dive for food."

Wu's photographs and the notes will take you on an eye-opening visit to the Antarctic and its wondrous wildlife.

  - Q: Has anybody ever caught and tagged a goosefish/monkfish?
- A: Yes, a six-pounder was caught, tagged, and released 2.12 miles south-southeast of Block Island, RI. When it was recaptured 14 years later; it weighed 61 pounds, counting a stomach full of red-breasted mergansers and one diver's light.
  - Q: If you catch a fish, can you eat it? (I am 9 years old.)
- A: Absolutely not. Most seafood is toxic unless boiled for an hour and then it doesn't taste good. After a fishing trip, grab what your mother tells me is your usual snack: 2 Devil Dogs, some Oreos, a Milky Way, and a Classic Coke. (Please show this to your dentist.)
- Q: Dude, can you, like, you know, email me 2000 words on, you know, riptides for my tenth grade science class paper like quick?
  - A: You know, I don't know. Actually, I do know. No.
  - Q: What is bulabase?
- A: Actually it's spelled bouillabaisse. It's French for fish soup; derived from two Latin words which mean, roughly, boil a bass. Bouillabaisse can be made from pretty much any seafood you have on hand, even leftover bait. I once made a great one with some old squid, two sea robins, a bunch of surf clams, and two chicken bouillon cubes. Don't confuse bouillabaisse with pot-au-feu, a soupy stew the French make with meat and vegetables. Then there is good old slumgullion, a watery meat stew native to the good old U.S. of A.
